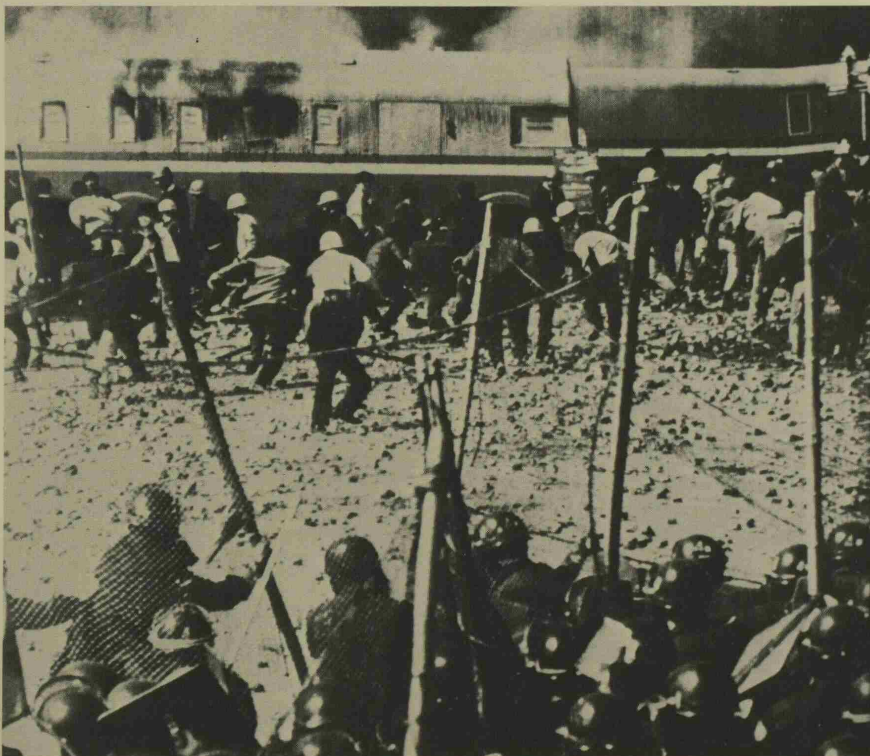


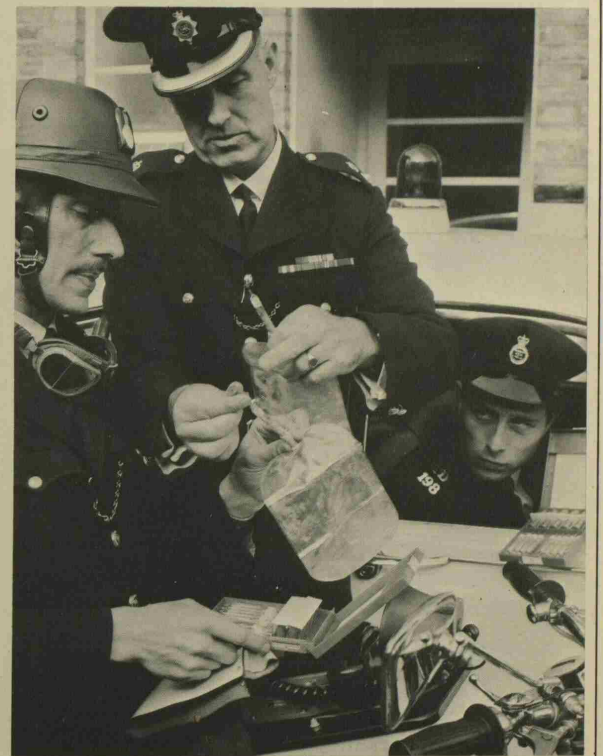


RELIGIOUS EDUCATION STUDY: The Church of England Board of Education, in association with the National Society, has, it was announced on October 4, set up a commission to study the problem of religious education in schools, the first detailed study for over 40 years. CHINESE AND INDIANS IN BORDER CLASH: India had 251 casualties, including 86 dead, as a result of clashes throughout September with Chinese troops on the Sikkim-Tibet border (left), according to a New Delhi spokesman. In a four-day artillery duel 65 Indian soldiers were killed and 145 wounded; Chinese casualties were between 400-600. These clashes have been the worst since the Indian-Chinese war in 1962. Sikkim is a buffer state under India's protection and Tibet has been annexed by China.



JAPANESE STUDENTS RIOT: A group of 2,000 Left-wing students tried to block the road outside the main Tokyo airport, Haneda, on October 8, in protest against the departure of the prime minister, Mr Sato, on a tour of Asian countries including South Vietnam. Police vehicles, seen here, were burnt, and nearly 700 policemen injured, and one student killed and 84 injured. The riots were the worst since the 1960 demonstration against the America-Japan security treaty, when a girl student was killed. About 50 other demonstrators gathered inside the airport, among them traders with China and other businessmen, but these used no violence.



THE DAY OF THE BREATHALYSER: Crystal and plastic bag apparatus was issued to police at Southwark (above) and all over the country last week in preparation for the new drink and driving laws which came into operation at midnight on October 8. It is now an offence to drive, or attempt to drive, with 80 or more milligrammes of alcohol in 100 millilitres of blood. Penalties include up to a year's disqualification, fines and prison.
